"NOT SO SUBTLE SUBTITLE"

After a turn in the Whitney Biennial and a recent solo show at Petzel, Matthew Brannon curates an exhibition that could double as a user's guide for his own work. The spare, graphic stylishness of his letterpress prints is seen in works by Robert Ashley, Christopher Williams, Tom Burr, Matthew Higgs, and Sarah Morris; his sly, self-penned tongue-in-cheek texts are echoed by Matthew Cerletty, Matt Keegan, and Sharon Ebner; and his cryptic visual poeticism is similar to that of Eileen Quinlan, Michelle Elzay, and John Stezaker (and to the conceptual poetics of Jack Goldstein's suite of seven-inch records with sound effects like "three felled trees" and "the lost ocean liner"). A handsome booklet with writings by Isabelle Graw, Bret Easton Ellis, and Liam Gillick further collapses—as Brannon's own work does—the distinctions between art and design, poetry and prose.
